

Christmas in Ireland

Christmas in Ireland is celebrated much as it is here but with a couple of unique traditions. Irish Catholics celebrate Christmas from the Eve, December 24th, to January 6th, the Feast of the Epiphany. Twisted syntax has led this day to be referred to as "Small Women's Christmas," but of course it is "Little Christmas," celebrating the arrival of the Magi with gifts: gold, symbolic of kingship on earth; frankincense, symbolic of diety; and myrrh, an embalming oil, symbolic of death. Prior to Advent families, at least those in the countryside (Culchies), begin forming their candles, large, thick tallow candles that are placed in a holder. In our parents and grandparents time candle holders were usually hollowed out turnips. In turn, those candles were placed on the window sill inside the home, ostensible to light the way for Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Here we've usually strung Christmas lights outside our houses. Traditional meals served are goose, turkey, ham or pork roast, with all the trimmings.

The day after Christmas, St. Stephen's Day, also known as the Wren's Day, is an opportunity for several pursuits: young children use it as an opportunity to dress in some form of costume and call to the neighbors while adults often use it to accompany children collecting monies for various charities. Then, too, it's usually an occasion for another celebratory meal and house dancing, an opportunity for local musicians to gather at a local rambling house, meaning one where the occupant usually hosts music and dancing for the locals. This is especially popular in the south of Ireland, particularly County Kerry's heavily Gaeltacht area of Dingle. But no Christmas season would be complete without the traditional Christmas Cake, a rich fruit cake, months in the making because of the need to treat it with brushfulls of fine Irish whiskey, enrobed in marzipan and covered with a stiff white royal icing (make sure your dental insurance is up to date before attempting a piece). That cake

can last for weeks or be gone in a matter of an afternoon. It was also the traditional wedding cake for our parents and grandparents. NOLLAIG SHONA DAOIBH.
